The Theme of the Bible

Monday—Jesus in the Law of Moses

“And he said unto them, These *are* the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the **law of Moses**, and *in* the prophets, and *in* the psalms, concerning me” (Luke 24:44). Jesus shows here the major divisions within the Old Testament. They are the law, the prophets and the psalms. In today’s lesson we will study about Jesus in the books written by Moses. Moses wrote the first five books (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy) of the Old Testament.

Jesus in the book of Genesis

The book of Genesis teaches about beginnings. It reveals the beginning of all that exists. God created everything in six days. This fact disproves the theory of evolution. Can you list the things that God made on each of the days? The beginning of mankind is more fully revealed in Genesis chapter two. God creates Adam (Genesis 2:7) and then Eve is made from his rib. They become husband and wife. This is the beginning of family. Sadly, this book of Moses records the beginning of sin within the realm of man (Romans 5:12; 1 Timothy 2:13, 14).

The book of Genesis can be remembered by $4 + 4 = \text{Genesis}$. There are four major events (creation, sin, flood and going to Egypt) plus four major characters (Adam, Noah, Abraham and Joseph).

How does one find Jesus in the book? First, He is there in the creation. “In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made” (John 1:1-3; Hebrews 1:2). Second, He is the answer to the problem of sin. “And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel” (Genesis 3:15). Sin entered the world and God put into effect His plan to provide forgiveness. This forgiveness would be available to the entire world. Jesus, in fulfillment of the promise to Abraham (Genesis 12:1-3; Galatians 3), would be the blessing for everyone! The book of Genesis begins to show God’s great love for man. He wants us to be saved. We must be saved by Jesus (Acts 4:12).

Jesus in the book of Exodus

The book of Exodus is a continuation of Genesis. The Israelites are still in Egypt. They have been made slaves under Pharaoh. This is not where God's people belonged. The book of Exodus is the story of how God brings the people out of bondage and leads them toward the Promised Land. He does this under the leadership of Moses. God gives the 10 commandments and other laws to govern the Israelites. Worship to the only God is started with the building of the tabernacle.

Where is Jesus found in the book of Exodus? We will study about two ways in today's lesson. He is found in the Passover. Read Exodus 12 to see about this feast. Only those who had the blood were saved from death. Jesus is our Passover (1 Corinthians 5:7). His blood must cover us in order to be saved from spiritual death (Ephesians 2:1; Revelation 1:5). Second, we see Jesus as the lawgiver. Moses brought the law down from Mt. Sinai. This law was for the Jewish people. Jesus brought God's law down from heaven (James 4:12; Galatians 6:2). This law is for all people in the world (Acts 10:42, 43).

Jesus in the book of Leviticus

The book of Leviticus is an instruction for the priests. These men were of the tribe of Levi. No other Israelites were allowed to serve in the tabernacle and later the temple. The book contains information on various sacrifices (Leviticus 1-6). It tells who could be a priest and what was required of him. Leviticus provides instruction about the feast days (Passover, Pentecost and Atonement) and what is clean and unclean.

In this book Jesus can be found in a number of symbols. One is the High Priest. This man under the Law of Moses was the only one who could enter the Most Holy Place on the Day of Atonement. On this day an offering was made for the sins of the people. Jesus is our High Priest (Hebrews 9:11-14). He ascended to heaven to make an offering for our sins (Hebrews 9:24, 28). The next symbol by which we see Jesus is the "scapegoat." Have you ever heard of someone who was made a scapegoat? What does it mean? Moses shows the purpose of a scapegoat in Leviticus 16. This goat symbolically carried the sins of the people into the wilderness. When we are forgiven Jesus takes our sins far away (Psalm 103:12). They are carried so far that they are remembered by God no more (Hebrews 8:12).

Jesus in the book of Numbers

The book of Numbers is about the continuing journey of the Israelites. By the title of the book we learn something about it. The children of Israel are numbered.

In what way can we see Jesus in this book? Once more we will look at two illustrations. First, because of the rebellion and murmuring (Leviticus 21) of

the people God sent fiery serpents among the people. The only way for them to be healed was to look upon the Brazen Serpent. Jesus uses the same language to speak of Himself (John 3:14-17). He was to be lifted up on the cross (John 12:32, 33). Only by Jesus' death on the cross can we be saved. It was because of the Jews obedience that they were saved. The same is true for us (Hebrews 5:9). Second, in Numbers 35 there is the selection of the cities of refuge. Six cities were chosen where one could find refuge and safety. Jesus is our refuge and we must abide in Him (2 Timothy 2:10). Are you there?

Jesus in Deuteronomy

This book is the repetition of the law to the generation about to enter the Promised Land. The old generation had died in the wilderness. Because he struck the rock Moses is not going to be allowed to enter with them (Numbers 20:12).

Jesus is seen in Deuteronomy in the person of Moses. "The LORD thy God will raise up unto thee a Prophet from the midst of thee, of thy brethren, like unto me; unto him ye shall hearken" (Deuteronomy 18:15). Luke records this as being fulfilled in Christ (Acts 3:22-26). Are we listening to Jesus in all things?

Jesus is the theme of the Bible. He is found over and over in the Law of Moses.

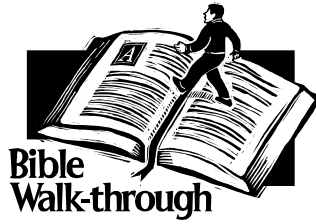

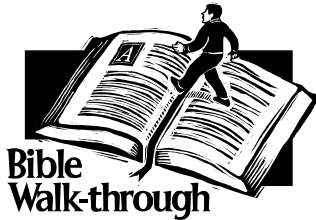

Tuesday—Jesus in the Prophets

“And he said unto them, These *are* the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the law of Moses, and *in the prophets*, and *in* the psalms, concerning me” (Luke 24:44). Jesus shows here the major divisions within the Old Testament. They are the law, the prophets and the psalms. In today’s lesson we will study about Jesus in the books written by the prophets.

What was a prophet? He was one who foretold the future while at the same time preaching to those of his own day. There is a great difference between real and fake prophets. “And if thou say in thine heart, How shall we know the word which the LORD hath not spoken? When a prophet speaketh in the name of the LORD, if the thing follow not, nor come to pass, that *is* the thing which the LORD hath not spoken, *but* the prophet hath spoken it presumptuously: thou shalt not be afraid of him” (Deuteronomy 18:21-22).

How did the prophets prophesy? Were they able to tell the future by their own ability? By what power could they tell of events that would happen hundreds of years away? “We have also a more sure word of prophecy; whereunto ye do well that ye take heed, as unto a light that shineth in a dark place, until the day dawn, and the day star arise in your hearts: Knowing this first, that no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake *as they were* moved by the Holy Ghost” (2 Peter 1:19-21).

Why did these men speak about the future? Our theme verse, Luke 24:44, tells us that it was to confirm the deity of Jesus. No one else fulfilled all these prophecies. This is one of the greatest proofs for the inspiration of the Bible. Joshua stated a principle that is still true. “And the LORD gave unto Israel all the land which he sware to give unto their fathers; and they possessed it, and dwelt therein. And the LORD gave them rest round about, according to all that he sware unto their fathers: and there stood not a man of all their enemies before them; the LORD delivered all their enemies into their hand. There failed not ought of any good thing which the LORD had spoken unto the house of Israel; all came to pass” (Joshua 21:43-45). If one prophecy had failed then God would have been shown to be a liar.

There are over 300 direct prophecies that relate to Jesus. We will list only a few of them here, but you can find a more complete list at the back of this booklet.

The birth of Jesus in prophecy and fulfillment:

Born of a virgin—Isaiah 7:14 & Matthew 1:23

Time of birth—Daniel 2:44 & Luke 2:1-5 (Galatians 4:4)

Ministry—Isaiah 8:22-9:1 & Matthew 4:12-16

Rejection—Isaiah 53: 3 & John 1:11

Entry into Jerusalem—Zechariah 9:9 & Mark 11:7, 9, 11

Events up to and including the death in prophecy and fulfillment:

Betrayal—Psalm 41:9 & Matthew 26:25

30 pieces—Zechariah 11:12 & Matthew 26:14-15

Thieves—Isaiah 53:12 & Mark 15:27, 28

Pierced—Zechariah 12:10 & Luke 24:39

Burial—Isaiah 53:9 & Matthew 27:57-60

Jesus is found over and over within the statements of the prophets. He fulfilled everything that was prophesied!

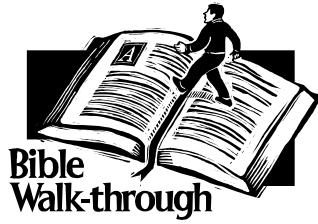

Wednesday—Jesus in the Psalms

“And he said unto them, These *are* the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the law of Moses, and *in* the prophets, and *in the psalms*, concerning me” (Luke 24:44). Jesus shows here the major divisions within the Old Testament. They are the law, the prophets and the psalms. In today’s lesson we will study about Jesus in the songs written in the book of Psalms.

The book of Psalms was the Jewish songbook. These words were written in Hebrew poetry and were sung in worship. The book of Psalms is the largest book within the Bible.

One of the great parts of camp is the singing. It is a joy to hear the voices of young and old alike joining together to worship God. “...is any merry, let him sing psalms” (James 5:13). It is because of the joy in our hearts that we are able to sing. What is to be the message of our songs? Should it not be the same as our preaching? “And I, brethren, when I came to you, came not with excellency of speech or of wisdom, declaring unto you the testimony of God. For I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified” (1 Corinthians 2:1, 2).

Jesus can be found in the Old Testament book of Psalms. These words are also prophecies made about His life, death and resurrection.

- He would speak in parables—Psalm 78:2-4 & Matthew 13:34-35.
- He would become a priest—Psalm 110:4 & Hebrews 5:5-6.
- Jesus would be betrayed by a friend—Psalm 41:9 & Matthew 26:21-25.
- There would be false witnesses—Psalm 35:11 & Mark 14:57-58.
- He would be hated—Psalm 35:19 & John 15:24-25.
- He would be mocked—Psalm 22:7-8 & Matthew 27:32.
- There would be enemies—Psalm 109:4 & Luke 23:34.
- His clothes would be parted—Psalm 22:17-18 & Matthew 27:35-36.
- Not a bone broken—Psalm 34:20 & John 19:34.
- There would be a resurrection—Psalm 16:10 & Mark 16:6-7.
- He would ascend—Psalm 16:11 & Mark 16:19

This is just a small sample of the Psalms that tell about the coming Messiah. More can be found in the back of the book.

The Book of Psalms can be divided into five smaller “books.” They are Psalm 1-41 (book 1); Psalm 42-72 (book 2); Psalm 73-89 (book 3); Psalm 90-106 (book 4) and Psalm 107-150 (book 5). Jesus can be found in every section of the Psalms.

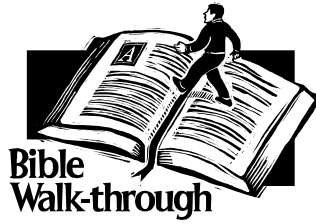

Thursday—Jesus in the New Testament

“And he said unto them, These *are* the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the law of Moses, and *in* the prophets, and *in* the psalms, **concerning me**” (Luke 24:44). Jesus shows here the major divisions within the Old Testament. The Old Testament proclaimed that Jesus was coming. The New Testament declares He came. Today we will briefly look at the New Testament and see that Jesus is the theme of this section of the Bible.

Jesus in the Gospel accounts:

The four books of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John record the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus. This shows the fulfillment of those things “written aforehand” (Romans 15:4) in the person of Jesus. Matthew states twelve times (Mt 1:22; 2:15,23; 4:14; 5:17; 8:17; 12:17; 13:14,35; 21:4; 27:9) that Old Testament prophecies found their fulfillment in Jesus. He also quotes from most of the Old Testament books. Matthew shows Jesus to be the expected King. Mark reveals Jesus to be the Servant of God. Luke records the life of Jesus as the Son of Man. John begins by showing the pre-existence of Jesus. Moving through the book Jesus is shown to be the “I am” (6:35; 8:12; 8:58; 10:7; 10:11; 11:25; 14:6; 15:1). John ends by telling us the purpose for the writing of the gospel accounts. “And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book: But these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name” (John 20:30-31). These accounts recorded what was necessary to produce saving faith (John 21:25). “And there are also many other things which Jesus did, the which, if they should be written every one, I suppose that even the world itself could not contain the books that should be written.”

Jesus in the book of Act:

The book of Acts begins with the return of Jesus to heaven (Acts 1:11). How will we be able to find Jesus in this book? He is there over and over. He is “approved” of God (Acts 2:22) because of the things He did. Next, He is victorious over death (Acts 2:24). When He went back to heaven it was to sit on the “right hand” of God (Acts 2:33). He continues to reign from that

exalted position (1 Timothy 6:15). Throughout the book He is seen as the only hope for mankind (Acts 2:38, 39; 8:5, 12; 10:36; 16:30, 31; 24:14, 15; 28:20).

Jesus in the Epistles:

With the church's beginning in the book of Acts there would be a need for direction to this new body. The epistles are letters written to congregations and individuals about how to live as Christians (1 Timothy 3:15). It did not matter where they located, the message would still be the same (1 Corinthians 4:17). Why? There is only one body (Ephesians 4:4) with one head (Jesus—Colossians 1:18) over it.

Jesus is continually exalted throughout the epistles. He is shown to be Savior (1 Timothy 2:4; Ephesians 5:23). Following Him should be our greatest desire (1 Peter 2:21). He will lead and take us home (1 Corinthians 15:24, 25).

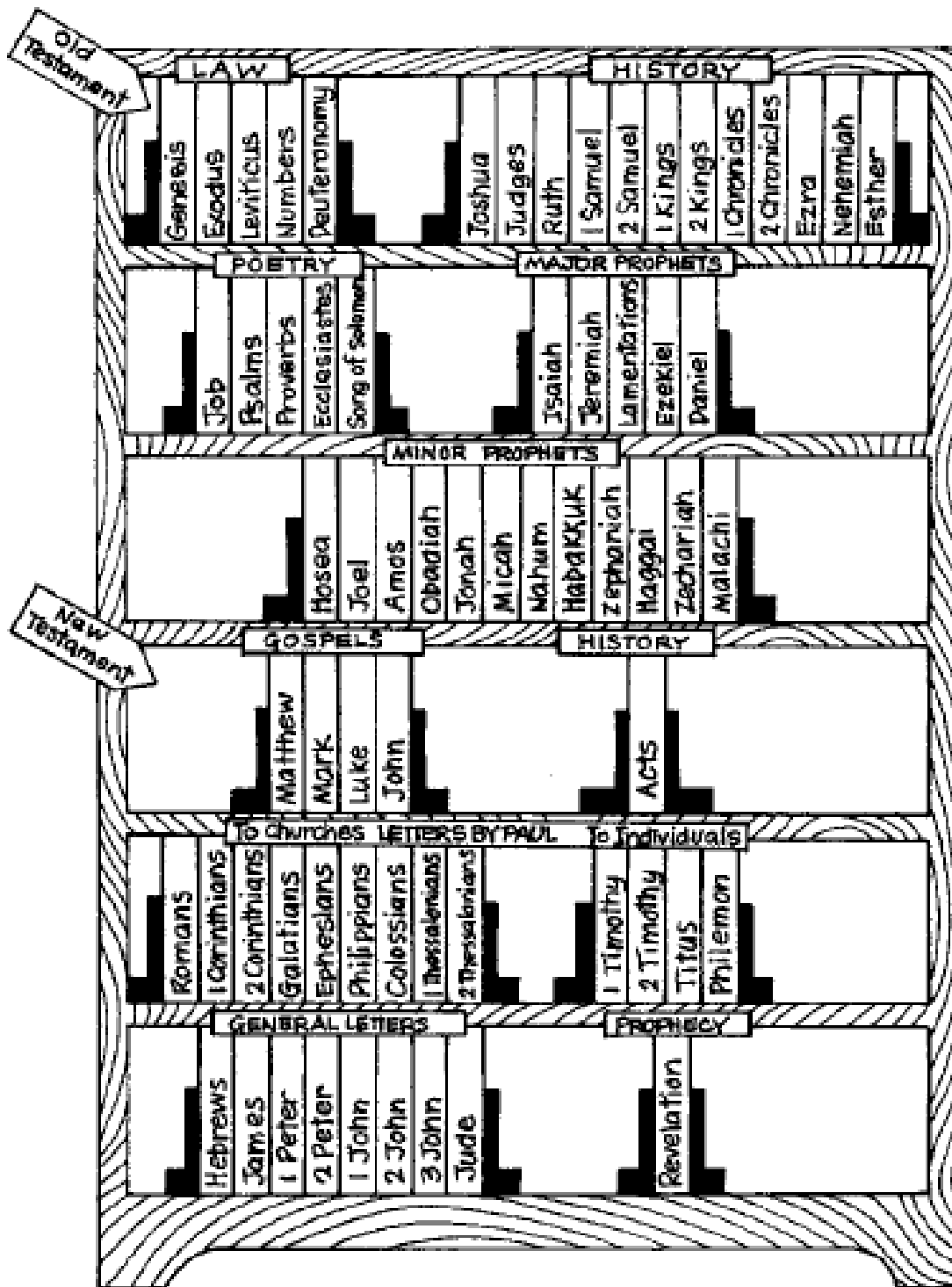
Jesus in the book of Revelation:

This book shows Jesus as the victor. Why did He die? He suffered death upon the cross for you and me! He died so we could be victorious. The final book of the New Testament gives great comfort (Rev. 21:1-4). The child of God can resist and endure the temptations of the devil. If the Christian remains faithful (Rev. 2:10) to Jesus he can be victorious, just as Jesus was. We can overcome because He overcame. "Thanks be to God for His unspeakable gift" (2 Corinthians 9:15).

As we read the Bible may we do so with the understanding that we can find Jesus on every page. Truly, Jesus is THE theme of the Bible

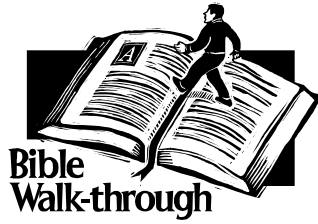

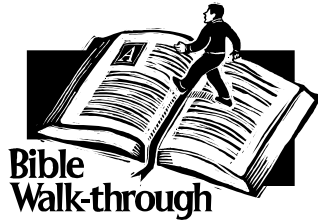
